Dear brothers and sisters,

Here's a question to ponder: “Who is US?”

No, I don't mean “Who are we?” We have a lot of good answers for that question: we are children of God, members of St. Philip's, Episcopalians, North Country dwellers, and many other things. What I mean is – when we use the word US, who are we talking about?

In Matthew 25, Jesus tells a parable about Judgment Day. In the Judgment, Jesus said, the King separates people like a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. To the sheep, on his right, he says, “Blessed are you because you fed me when I was hungry, you gave me something to drink when I was thirsty, you clothed me when I was naked, and you visited me when I was lonely and sick and in prison.” To the goats, on his left, he says, “Cursed are you because when I was hungry you gave me nothing to eat, and when I was thirsty you gave me nothing to drink, and when I was naked you didn't give me anything to put on, and when I was lonely, and sick, and in prison, you didn't come to visit me.” The remarkable thing about the parable is that every single person, sheep and goat alike, responds to the King's judgment in the same way. Every one of them is baffled by what the King has said, “Lord,” they ask, “when did we ever see you hungry, or thirsty, or naked, or lonely, or sick, or in prison?”

But listen to the King's answer “That homeless man asking for spare change in the grocery store parking lot – that was us. And that sweaty garbage collector hoisting your heavy bags of trash into his truck when it was 90 degrees in the shade – that was us. And that little boy waiting for the school bus in his shirt sleeves

in the middle of January – that was us. And that strange woman you see wandering the halls of the nursing home every time you visit your friend – that was us. And that cranky old guy you had to be roommates with in the hospital after your surgery – that was us. And that young man on the news who is being locked up for crimes that literally made you sick to your stomach when you heard about them – well, that was us, too.”

In our honest striving towards being Christlike, as good Christians we make every effort to show the love of God to those who are not like us. But as we grow deeper into Christ, we may be shocked to discover that it isn't always among the “people like us” that we will find him. We find, in fact, that if we are truly Christ's, then the poor, the dirty, the uneducated, the lonely, the addicts, the forgotten, the troubled – then they are us.

Let us all grow deeper together into the mystery of Christ's Presence,







### This is my Father's world


This is my Father's world,

## Community Meals May and June

St. Philip's has a long and delicious history of feeding people. It seems to be part of our spiritual DNA, and we do it very well, I think. Our freewill meals, along with our Thrift Shop, are the primary ways we reach out to be a blessing to our neighbors. This summer, we are going to try something new with our community meals, for two reasons.

First, we have noticed that our dinners haven't reached as many of the truly needy people we had hoped to feed. There are so many lonely people in our community, so many elderly who live and eat alone, as well as so many families who have a hard time making ends meet. There is so much hunger out there, physical, emotional and spiritual. And yet, our dinners don't often seem to attract the people who need them the most.

Second, our volunteers often find it hard to make it out in the evening to serve and clean up from a big dinner. Lately we sometimes seem to be a little short-handed.


So, we are trying something different for the summer. Because I still believe with all my heart that we are called to feed people, we are going to try offering community lunches over the summer, instead of dinners. It is my hope that we can get the word out to the residents at Baldwin Acres, and to the general community, and that a simpler, more casual (and earlier) meal might bring more of the people who need our ministry. And it is also my hope that more of our own members might be able to participate in the lunches.

We will have our final dinner in May, and then in the fourth week of June we'll have our first Freewill Lunch. Who knows, eventually we might be able to have more than one lunch each month – but that is a thought for another day! Let's see what happens.....

And unsold clothes are now taken to be recycled at the transfer station on Rt. 420 in Massena. Otherwise, it's still business as usual. And we still need you!

### Happy Birthday Common Cents!

One year ago, after much prayer and thought and discussion, the basement of St. Philip's was transformed – from an empty, newly-renovated basement, to a thriving community ministry. The idea of a Thrift Shop first arose from canvassing the many, many people ministering in our community, to find what need might exist that we, with our space and abilities, could supply. Our conclusion? A Thrift Shop! And God blessed our conclusion abundantly.

First and most importantly, he equipped Sharon Yousey to lead and to teach us, with her many years' experience. But he provided in so many other ways. The community has been lavish in giving us excellent donations, so that our big, echoing empty space was soon full. We were able to find good, sturdy racks and shelves at very reasonable prices. And a faithful core of St. Philippians have given of their time and energies to keep things running - and have even come running in our times of emergency! Thank you all! We are also so very thankful to the women of St. Andrew's for their many, many generous and faithful volunteer hours.

So now Common Cents is one year old, and we are in full swing, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, 10 hours a week. But more than 10 hours a week goes into keeping things organized and tidy and welcoming down there. Common Cents (along with our ever-popular monthly Community Dinner!) is our church family's primary way of reaching out to our neighbors, and of demonstrating the love of God in ways that can be seen and touched. And more hands are needed. Not everyone can work in the Shop every week, but nearly everyone could commit to helping in some way. Sharon has made up a list of ways that people might help out:

#### Keeping the space clean:

- sweeping floors
- dusting shelves in the housewares room
- cleaning off the windowsills (aka bug patrol)
- dusting off the clothing racks

#### Taking care of donations:

- washing clothes that arrive needing it
- sewing on buttons or other light sewing (Sharon has a supply of buttons)
- cleaning up houseware donations if needed
- hanging up clothes
- stocking shelves

#### Customer service:

- sitting at the desk to check people out (our system is VERY simple!)

#### Organization:

- making signs to hang on the wall, or for the racks
- taking unsaleable clothing items to the CORC store in Potsdam for the truck (we try not to waste anything!)

Could you see yourself doing one or more of these jobs once a week? Once a month? Please know that you are very much needed! Please, prayerfully consider how you can become a more active part of this important and thriving outreach to our community. **Common Cents is OUR ministry.**
